These are exciting times around John Knox Village. Residents are still talking about the gala New Year's Eve Party featuring the Motowners held in the Cultural Arts Center (CAC). As the revelers entered the CAC, they immediately recognized that Westlake at JKV with its two residential towers: The View and The Terrace were nearing completion.

The walkway around the expanded and reconfigured Lake Maggie is nearly complete. The interior lighting of the new buildings is visible well into the night, as the finishing touches are made to the interior of Westlake at JKV.

There are 147 state-of-the-art sun-soaked apartments, two floors of covered parking, and a first floor filled with amenities that will be available to all residents, family members, and guests. The common-area niceties include:

Sounds of Broadway During The Holidays at JKV

The JKV Holiday Concert schedule offered a wide-ranging and varied collection of talent from local musicians, all the way to New York City's Broadway. On Dec. 4, songstress Kelli Rabke, with her talented accompanist John Fischer on piano, took us on a journey through some of Broadway's most memorable holiday hits.

Kelli has a long resume as both a singer and theatrical performer. She got her "big break" playing the role of Dorothy in Paper Mill Playhouse's acclaimed production of "The Wizard of Oz." Shortly thereafter, she was handpicked by Andrew Lloyd Webber to play the lead role of the Narrator in the Broadway revival of "Joseph And The Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat." From there, she played her dream role as Eponine in "Les Miserables" on Broadway.

After years performing in regional theaters, features in TV commercials and voice-overs, Kelli left the bright lights of the stage to start a family.

She, along with her musical partner John Fischer, are now staples in the New York City cabaret world.

During their concert, Kelli and John took us back to some of the classic holiday songs from the '40s including: Hugh Martin and Ralph Blane's "Have Yourself A Merry Little Christmas," and the Irving Berlin song made famous by Bing Crosby, "White Christmas."

John took center stage in a vocal and piano performance of Vince Guaraldi's compositions for "A Charlie Brown Christmas," followed by "You're A Mean One Mr. Grinch," originally written and composed for the 1966 cartoon special "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!"

Kelli and John delivered a wonderful holiday performance reminding us that it is "Lovely Weather for a Sleigh Ride Together With You," and "Baby It's Cold Outside," when "It's Christmas Time in the City."

True to her "Wizard of Oz" Dorothy roots, Kelli ended the concert with the song "Home."

"When I think of home, I think of a resting place, a place where there's peace, quiet and serenity."

The JKV Choruses Concert Three Resident Groups Showcase Amazing Musical Talent

when Ron was in the hospital. During his stay, Ron received phone calls from fellow residents singing to wish him 'Happy Birthday.' Ron thought to himself "These guys can sing! And maybe there were other guys in The Village who would also want to sing." From that epiphany, The Villagers were born.

Shortly after The Villagers began, noted resident songstress, the late Dr. "Diva" Harriett Mertz formed a ladies singing group – The Noteables. For years, both The Noteables and The Villagers were mainstays on JKV stages and venues in the greater community, performing for appreciative audiences.



JKV Resident Authors Seven Books David Haun Fulfills a Lifetime Goal During His 20 Years at JKV



David Haun and his wife Twylah are longtime John Knox Village residents. Having been one of the first couples who moved into the then-new Heritage Tower apartment building, the Hauns have been active in community life. During their more than 20 years of residency, they have served on committees, volunteered their time and talents in Village services, and have pursued their lifelong goals.

Prior to moving to JKV, they had lived in Wilton Manors for 35 years. Most of those years they worked—Twylah as a teacher and David a pastor. Twylah's mother, Marie was living at John Knox Village, so they moved as soon as they were age qualified, and have loved their involvement in the life of JKV.


During his years at the Village, David had an unfulfilled goal. He wanted to become a published author. He told the *Gazette ACE*, that ever since he was a little boy, he had wanted to write.

"My mother and I used to sit on a swing, when I was in first or second grade, we'd make up stories, we'd make up poems," David said. For all the many years after sitting with his mom on that swing, David still wanted to author books, "But never thought I would have the ability to publish until I moved to John Knox." Writing and pub-

lishing his own books was David's dream and goal in life.

"The possibility of the dream coming to life presented itself one day in the lobby of Heritage Tower," he said. "A notice of an invitation to residents to write down their dreams and fasten them to the wall. I wrote my dream – that I might write and publish five books before I died.


'Shortly after that I saw that Marty Lee [contributing writer and photographer at JKV] was offering to help residents publish their life story through a class called 'Silver Scribers.' Marty said if we'd write it, he will put it together and get it published on Amazon.

"I asked Marty, if he would help me publish a children's story. He said he would—but I'd have to find an artist. So, I prayed for one, and in a matter of days I met Curtis Iverson, living right here at John Knox Village and discovered he was an artist. Those chance meetings lead to the creation and publication of my first book, 'Jack and the Really Big Beanstalk.'


"After Jack was published, I had two other children's stories, and didn't know how to get them published. Then my daughters called and said, 'Dad, you write the stories and get the illustrations [for the two children's books] and we'll get them published on Amazon.'"

Now with his daughters' assistance, David has embraced his goal, and to date, has published seven books.



One has crisscrossed the country chasing his culinary passions. The other has crossed the Atlantic pursuing his.

After years in high-end pedigree dining venues in Europe and the U.S., they have both landed at John Knox Village and together they make up the Village's Dynamic Dining Duo.

Lance Sanson, Vice President of Campus Dining, and Executive Chef Frederic Delaire are from worlds apart; however, they are similar in their desire to provide the highest caliber dining experience for the 1,000 residents who call JKV home.

Lance's hospitality career began at the famed Chanterelle restaurant in Eugene, OR, while Chef Frederic was working, watching, and learning from his grandfather, a well-known baker in southwest France.

Lance's resume boasts stints at the prestigious Pepi's Restaurant and Bar in Vail Village, CO, where he did tableside cookery and fine wine decanting. Fast-tracking to the late 1990s and Lance worked with food service industry innovator and leader Bill Anton at Anton Airfood, where he opened the first wine bar in JFK Airport's International Terminal One and was charged with transitioning airport food into airport dining.

Most recently, Lance headed the Guest Services at Life-Plan Continuing Care Retirement Community Moorings Park, in Naples, FL.

He sees similarities from there to JKV: "I created a Hospitality Training Platform called Diamond Dining, which combined compassionate care, values with resident understanding and table service to individuals who had not worked in dining before."

Lance also partnered with his Certified Executive Chefs to create the first senior living accredited campus for training culinarians to be trained as chefs who could not afford school.

Meanwhile, across The Pond, Chef Frederic was studying at the La Palme School for Culinary Arts in France. After school, Chef started his journey at the 2-Star Michelin restaurant L'Aubergade in Puymirol, southwest France.

Struck by wanderlust after four years, Chef Frederic traveled to Germany to work with German Chef Christian Lohse at the restaurant Die Windmule in Westphalia. In 1997, he returned to France to join the team at the famous Michelin Star restaurant Jules Verne, located on the second floor of the Eiffel Tower, in Paris.

In 1999 Chef packed his bags and flew to South Florida. Among his stops as Executive Chef prior to joining JKV were at the Historic National Hotel on South Beach and Loews Miami Beach.

Chef Frederic has participated in the South Beach Wine & Food Festival for 13 years, collaborating on spectacular dining events, including the Tribute Dinner and Southern Brunch.

"The reason I am here is because of the man across the table," Chef Frederic told the *Gazette ACE* during a recent lunch at one of the Village's dining venues, the Seaglass, while pointing towards Lance. "He has a vision for John Knox Village, and I want to be a part of that. This is an exciting time to be here, and I look forward to helping make positive changes to the dining experience."


Anthony has already gained many admirers on campus, having performed at two birthday parties for residents, played in all four JKV apartment tower lobbies, and was the featured pianist for the recent Resident-Staff Talent Show, where he received a standing ovation for his rendition of *"Prelude in G Minor,"* by Sergei Rachmaninoff.

The South Florida native is in the midst of planning, preparing and practicing for an outdoor concert on campus titled: *"Classical Music Under the Stars,"* this spring.

Anthony started playing piano at the age of seven at the prestigious Morla Music Academy in Palm City, FL under the watchful eye of Rosana Torres, a certified Suzuki Piano teacher, and President of the South Florida Chapter of the Suzuki Association.

"By age 12, I fell in love with the music of [Frederic] Chopin and learned the *"Minute Waltz,"* which was a

breakthrough for me at the time. It became a piece I performed in a church. At age 14, I advanced my studies under the tutelage of the Steinway Artist Tao Lin and his wife, Catherine Lan."

The prodigiously talented husband-and-wife team of Lin and Lan, can be seen making musical magic during concerts in the area, occasionally with the South Florida Symphony.

However, when Anthony was attending high

school at Marjory Stoneman Douglas, he lost interest in playing the piano. While he found other interests to keep him occupied, Anthony never left piano completely.

"I continued learning pieces in my spare time by my favorite composers such as [Wolfgang Amadeus] Mozart and Chopin. Piano remained a casual hobby until I moved to Orlando and found a gig playing piano at a restaurant twice a week. The food wasn't very good, so I mainly stuck with the wine."

Working at John Knox has been instrumental in motivating to learn new pieces, which he has wanted to play but lacked the motivation.

"Currently, I'm preparing the notoriously difficult Chopin 'Ballade Number 1,' which I hope to perform

in the summer. In the meantime, I'm planning a "Nocturne Concert" in spring to perform under the stars at the gazebo behind JKV's Cassels Tower. An outdoor concert would be the perfect place to play nighttime music like "Moonlight Sonata" and Debussy," he told the Gazette ACE.

Anthony now owns an upright piano and squeezes in at least one hour of practice every day in his Pompano Beach home.


